With the excellent reputation of today's guest speaker, President Bill welcomed numerous guests.



Catherine Scheers introduced our **guest speaker**, **Martha Hall-Findlay**, Director and Chair of the University's School of Public Policy.

The topic: Where Public Policy Hits the Road – and Why it's More Important Now Than Ever. Hall-Findlay explained Canada's multi-year problem with low productivity, and how we've now been scared into recognition of how we need urgently to work together to overcome this deficit. She quoted from Manitoba Premier Wab Kinew "It's the economic horse that pulls the social cart". She spoke about the over-regulation of the past decade in contrast to the present encouraging signs, as well as the need to reduce inter-provincial trade barriers by collecting, managing and sharing data.

She also described how the School of Public Policy is made up and her aspirations for its significant impact.

There followed a lively and informative Q&A session before she was thanked by Catherine Scheers on behalf of a very appreciative audience.

Celebrating what matters most to RCCD...its 3-year funding strategy...

Major Donations Committee Chair Franco Savoia

In July 2024, after an extensive 18month consultation process, the RCCD board approved a 3-year funding strategy. As R. Topolnitsky outlined in the September 29th COG, this initiative would assist in focusing the Club's engagement and support with community partners to have an impact in our community in four areas of focus: early childhood literacy, education, mental wellness and food security. We are reminded of this strategy as we gather biweekly as a club through the banners at the door of our meeting room.

On Thursday October 9, the Calgary Foundation convened its annual Vital Signs gathering. This year's annual celebration was a more special event, as it is the Foundation's 70th birthday. A highlight of the party was a motivational presentation by <u>Peter Katz</u>. He shared that when leaders define and celebrate what matters most, they create organizations where people feel seen, connected, and inspired to deliver exceptional results.

For me, RCCD's approved 3-year funding strategy outlines "what matters most to our club" in our local work and engagement in our community. Interestingly, this not a dramatic departure from what the club has done to support services and programs in our city.

For example, RCCD's Major Donations Committee, completed a retrospective of its work over the past 10 years. RCCD members over the past decade, through its Major Donations Committee, invested just over \$1.6 million dollars in 73 projects with 45 community partners.

2025 Proceed Recipient News: How We're Getting Kids Reading This School Year

Rotary Club of Calgary Downtown proudly stewards Calgary Reads Big Book Sale, a critical fundraiser for local agencies and initiatives working to get kids reading before Grade 3. In the article below, find out how the 2025 sale's proceeds are being distributed to do just that!

Calgarians donate a book they've read and loved, and then another, and then another. Within 10 days at the Calgary Curling Club, where book donations are dropped off by readers and our Stuff-a-Truck event drivers, we receive thousands and thousands of gently used books across genres. Last spring, Calgary readers donated 200,000+ books and, during our 10-day sale in May, \$544,000 was raised to help kids read.

Our club's Early Childhood Literacy Committee (ECLC) recently met and determined how the sale's proceeds will be distributed this school year as part of the sale's mission to fund advocacy, book access and reading role model initiatives that ensure children can read at grade-level by Grade 3.

In addition to contributing to the growing operational costs of running the book sale, we're excited to share the following Calgary Reads Big Book Sale proceed recipients:

Kids Literacy Collective

\$250,000

<u>The Kids Literacy Collective is</u> a network of educators, community leaders, program providers, and literacy changemakers building the conditions where families, schools and communities are supported to raise readers from birth to age 8.

Kids Literacy Collective is continuing the story started by organizations such as Calgary Reads, First 2000 Days Network, Left Unread and Early Childhood Literacy Network—because there's still too much to do, and collaborating is to ensure each child's right to read is too important! <u>Learn More</u>

Book Bank

\$100,000

When children have books of their own to keep and re-read, they see themselves as readers and are exposed to more words which promotes healthy developmental milestones. In short, when children have books at home, they can get ready to learn and read when they start school.

And yet, 25 per cent of families say they don't spend time reading and 6 per cent say they don't own books [Source: Logan et al. (2019). *Journal of Developmental and Behavioral Pediatrics*. Clark et al.

(2021). National Literacy Trust (United Kingdom)].

That's why Book Bank gets books to families that need them most via a network of agencies-Little Red Reading House, Little Red Reading Van, and Little Free Libraries (LFL). Since it was started in 2015, Book Bank has distributed 166,547 books to children, engaged 125 agencies and stocked 80 Little Free Libraries across our city.

Now located at ShedPoint, Book Bank hosts monthly donation days to receive gently used children's books; volunteers have the rewarding job of sorting book donations to prepare holiday hamper contributions, agency drop-offs and LFL steward pickups headed to neighbourhoods throughout Calgary. <u>Learn More</u>

Calgary Public Library Foundation

\$30,000

Just like Rotary, Calgary Reads Big Book Sale and Kids Literacy Collective, the Calgary Public Library is proudly championing childhood literacy through access to books, spaces and programs that grow a love of reading. As part of a new partnership with the library foundation, in 2026, the library will host our popular Stuff-a-Truck events at one library locations, inviting community members to drop off gently used books that will go to Calgary Reads Big Book Sale. Book sale activities will be promoted to 825,000+ library members.

In turn, the donation of \$30,000 to the library foundation will support the library's:

- -New children's book purchases
- -Design and development of new and ongoing early literacy programs

Calgary Rotary Clubs

\$35,000

In 2025, we extended the volunteer/donation match opportunity to more local clubs. In exchange for volunteering as a group, these clubs receive \$5,000 to be donated to evidence-based early literacy initiatives in Calgary- growing a community of supporters and reach in getting kids reading.

The '25 sale also invested in the parking support provided by Rotary Chinook, which guided drivers in and out of the Calgary Curling Club parking lot and Lot 59. Amidst road closures and additional traffic congestion, with their parking flow guidance, we created a safe, smooth experience for book sale shoppers- and we're sure this helped to boost sales and our impact, as well as good neighbour relations.
